About Baltimore

Baltimore, also known as “Charm City,” offers a rich experience of ethnic neighborhoods, cultural diversity, Chesapeake Bay cuisine and a wealth of history. This bustling city is built on the traditions of its diverse working-class residents and their civic pride. Baltimore’s perfect blend of the old and the new makes the city’s urban renewal America’s success story. The conference hotel is located in Baltimore’s Inner Harbor, a model of downtown redevelopment and urban revitalization. This scenic and popular waterfront area with dozens of retail stores, restaurants and attractions within walking distance of one another welcomes nearly 12 million business and leisure visitors each year. But there’s more to Baltimore than this. Charming historic neighborhoods surround the Inner Harbor each filled with history, great food and plenty to explore! And better yet, you can get to them either on foot or by hopping aboard Ed Kane’s Water Taxi or the Seaport Taxi.

- **Little Italy**—Walk a few blocks from the Inner Harbor and treat yourself to your pick of restaurants offering authentic Italian cuisine.

Dine-Arounds

La Scala Ristorante Italiano—Mahogany chairs, multicolored tablecloths and tile floors give this family-owned restaurant its upscale appearance. Dishes include the veal chop, grilled Cesar salad, and shrimp Luana. Located in Little Italy.

Chiapparelli’s—Little Italy—Voted Maryland’s Restaurateur of the Year, Chiapparelli’s is one of Little Italy’s best-known and most-loved restaurants. The menu includes local seafood specials, delicious veal and homemade specialties.

Phillips Seafood Restaurant—The main dining room offers indoor and outdoor seating on the edge of the harbor. The extensive seafood menu includes the traditional Maryland-style seafood Phillips is famous for, as well as sandwiches, beef and chicken entrees.

- **Fell’s Point**—Get a feel for Baltimore’s British roots in Fell’s Point, named for an Englishman who started a shipbuilding company here in 1726. Historic 18th and 19th century homes and warehouses line cobblestone streets named Shakespeare, Bond, Fleet and Thames.
- **Federal Hill**—For a spectacular view of the harbor, walk up Federal Hill, where in 1788, 4,000 patriots celebrated Maryland’s ratification of the U.S. Constitution with a hilltop picnic and fireworks.
- **Mount Vernon**—George Washington’s Virginia estate may be the more famous landmark of this name, but the country’s very first Washington Monument was built right here in Baltimore’s Mt. Vernon neighborhood.
- **Canton**—In the late 19th century, European immigrants flocked to Canton for jobs in canneries, processing local fish and vegetables. Today, Canton’s factories have been converted into condos, artist’s studios, offices, eateries and shops.

McCormick & Schmick’s—Located at the end of Pier 5, on the east side of the busy waterfront, this restaurant offers a terrific harbor view. The large menu, which changes daily, is primarily seafood with more than two dozen varieties of fish and seafood flown in from around the world. Sample the many varieties of oysters on the half shell or one of the creative fish treatments such as Chilean sea bass with shiitake vinaigrette over wilted greens.

DeGroen’s Grill—Located on the site of the fifth brewery to be established in Baltimore, this brewery/restaurant melds tradition and a unique culinary approach that blends the best of German, American and regional Maryland cuisines that complement the fresh beers superbly.

Victor’s Cafe—This waterfront cafe offers Maryland cuisine with an international flair and provides the best view of the Baltimore Inner Harbor from the two-story restaurant.
